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Classroom: National School of Development Time: 2:00-5:00 pm, Monday

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Course description

This is a one-semester course in development economics. It targets students who have finished the basic courses and are looking for thesis or the second-year paper topics. In close interaction with me, each student will define and develop a specific topic, do a literature search and critical review, and write a term paper. In the process, I will guide the students to hone their observational, critical thinking, and logic writing skills.

During most of the semester, I will lecture on topics of interest to me, suggesting ideas for research and literatures for review. In the final week, students will present their own term papers. In between, students will work independently on the paper, interacting with me regularly and meeting various deadlines in relation to the writing of term papers. We will arrange a field trip on October 20-21 to visit Pingyu county in Henan Province. In addition, I will invite a few guest speakers to lecture in the class.

In this semester, I will focus on topics related to economic transformation, including division of labor, industrial policy, inequality, behavior of the poor, and the long-term welfare impact of the transformation. The themes are suggestive but not restrictive. Students can also explore other topics.

After each class, I'd be happy to have dinner together with up to five students. If you are interested in having dinner with me after the class, please talk to Jialiang.

Grade

We do not have a textbook for the class. The course does not have a final exam. All the registered students are required to write a term paper. There are three deadlines. Five points will be deduced for each overdue day passing the deadline. The term paper is expected to be around 35 pages (double space and inclusive of text, references, figures, and tables) in length if written in English. The class grade will be evaluated based on the quality of narrative (15 points), class attendance and participations (15 points, one point for each class

absence), the final paper (70 points) as well as the degree of meeting deadlines (potential negative points for missing deadlines).
